## **FESTIVAL GREETINGS**



In the UK today a range of festivals are celebrated by different faith communities, and greetings are sent for many of them.

The Inter Faith Network office often receives enquiries about the most appropriate festivals on which to send greetings and the form of greeting to use. The attached table of festivals and greetings has been produced with the IFN's Faith Communities Forum which brings together National Faith Community Representative Bodies in IFN membership.

Each faith community has many different festivals but has chosen two festivals on which greetings from those of other faiths and none would be particularly appreciated. These are included in the table with greetings that the faith communities bodies suggest\*.

If you are sending a greeting to someone on a festival, it is suitable to use either a card or electronic greeting specially designed for the festival in question, or a neutral one with an appropriate greeting inside.

Some festivals take place on the same date each year and others move. It is important to check the dates each year. The dates for the current year are shown. A number of faith festival calendars are produced each year. One of the most widely used is the calendar produced by IFN member body the Shap Working Party on World Religions in Education. This comes with a booklet explaining each festival (<a href="http://www.shapworkingparty.org.uk/">http://www.shapworkingparty.org.uk/</a>).
